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1 MAYOR WEINBERG: It's Steve Weinberg,
2 Mayor of the Village of Thomaston. And we're
3 opening up the Village of Thomaston Board of
4 Trustees meeting for Monday, July 13, 2020
5 via video conference. We're opening the
6 meeting at 7:36 p.m.

7 There is a statement that I have to read
8 before the actual meeting occurs and before
9 we call the roll.

10 Due to public health and safety concerns
11 related to COVID-19, and pursuant to
12 Governor's Executive Orders, this meeting of
13 the Board of Trustees is not being held in
14 person.

15 The Board is meeting by video
16 conferencing. The meeting will be recorded
17 and a transcription will be provided at a
18 later date. The public has the opportunity
19 to observe this meeting live online and to
20 submit comments pursuant to instructions
21 given on the Village website and in the
22 meeting notice.

23 Interested members of the public may

6 MAYOR WEINBERG: The board is in
7 attendance and we'll begin the board meeting.

9 MAYOR WEINBERG: Jim, can you give me the
10 resolution of the adoption of the minutes of
11 June 8, 2020?

12 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: The minutes of the
13 meeting of June 8, 2020. Adoption of
14 minutes. RESOLUTION 20-55.

15 MAYOR WEINBERG: 20-64.

16 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: I'm sorry. 20-64.

17 RESOLVED, that the minutes of the Board
18 of Trustees held on --

19 MAYOR WEINBERG: For June 8th.

20 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: -- June 8, 2020,
21 are hereby approved and accepted as
22 presented.

23 Are there any questions?

24 MAYOR WEINBERG: Is there a second?

1 TRUSTEE WESTON: Second.

2 MAYOR WEINBERG: Okay. Before we call
3 the question, are there any comments about
4 the minutes? Questions or corrections?

5 Hearing none, call the question.

6 Denise, would you call the roll, please?

7 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Deputy
8 Mayor Sharkey.

9 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: Aye.

10 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Trustee
11 Monoson.

12 TRUSTEE MONOSON: Aye.

13 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Trustee
14 Pang.

15 TRUSTEE PANG: Aye.

16 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: I didn't
17 hear that.

18 TRUSTEE PANG: Aye.

19 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Thank
20 you.

21 Trustee Weston.

22 TRUSTEE WESTON: Aye.

23 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Mayor
24 Weinberg.

1 MAYOR WEINBERG: Aye.

2 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: There
3 are four votes in favor, zero votes opposed.
4 The motion is adopted.

5 MAYOR WEINBERG: Should be five.

6 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Oh,
7 sorry. I'm sorry. Five votes in favor, zero
8 votes opposed and zero abstentions. The
9 motion is adopted. I apologize.

10 * * * * *

11 MAYOR WEINBERG: There was a proposed
12 general resolution to allow an extension of
13 any permits, building permits or approvals,
14 that may be expiring due to COVID-19. So I'm
15 going to make the motion for the RESOLUTION
16 which is 20-65.

17 WHEREAS, pursuant to Chapter 111 of the
18 Laws of 2020, the Board of Trustees is
19 authorized, by acting in a single resolution,
20 to extend for up to 120 days approvals issued
21 prior to March 7, 2020, for building permits
22 and zoning and planning approvals; and

23 WHEREAS, holders of such permits and
24 approvals have sustained delays in being able

1 to act in furtherance of permits or approvals
2 due to restrictions imposed during COVID-19
3 pandemic emergency; and

4 WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees hereby
5 finds and concludes that extending the
6 duration of some or all of such permits and
7 approvals is in the best interest of the
8 Village.

9 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

10 RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees
11 hereby extends the following permits or
12 approvals for the indicated periods of time.

13 (a) All building permits issued prior to
14 March 7, 2020, and which had not expired
15 prior to that date, are hereby extended for a
16 period of time until 120 days after the
17 otherwise applicable expiration date of such
18 permits;

19 (b) All zoning and planning approvals
20 granted prior to March 7, 2020, and periods
21 of time contained in such approvals within
22 which any action was required to be taken or
23 completed, which were in effect on such date,
24 are hereby extended for a period of time

1 until 120 days after the otherwise applicable
2 expiration date of such approvals or
3 requirements.

4 Is there a second?

5 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: I'll second.

6 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Okay.

7 James Sharkey seconded.

8 MAYOR WEINBERG: Does anyone have any
9 questions before we call the question?

10 Hearing none and no comments, Denise,
11 would you please call the roll.

12 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Deputy
13 Mayor Sharkey.

14 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: Aye.

15 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Trustee
16 Monoson.

17 TRUSTEE MONOSON: Aye.

18 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Trustee
19 Pang.

20 TRUSTEE PANG: Aye.

21 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Trustee
22 Weston.

23 TRUSTEE WESTON: Aye.

24 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Mayor

1 Weinberg.

2 MAYOR WEINBERG: Aye.

3 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: There
4 are five votes in favor, zero votes opposed,
5 zero abstentions. The motion is adopted.

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7 MAYOR WEINBERG: The next item on the
8 agenda is RESOLUTION 20-66. Setting the
9 village election polling place to have our
10 long awaited and delayed Village election.

11 Burton, would you like to read the
12 resolution?

13 TRUSTEE WESTON: Surely.

14 RESOLUTION 20-66.

15 WHEREAS, pursuant to the Election Law,
16 the Board of Trustees is required to
17 designate the polling place for the village
18 election to be held on September 15, 2020,
19 and the hours of election.

20 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

21 RESOLVED, that the polling place for the
22 village election to be held on September 15,
23 2020, shall be Thomaston Village Hall, 100
24 East Shore Road, Thomaston, New York, and it

1 is further

2 RESOLVED, that the hours of said village
3 election shall be from noon to 9:00 p.m.
4 inclusive.

5 MAYOR WEINBERG: Is there a second to the
6 motion?

7 TRUSTEE MONOSON: I'll second.

8 MAYOR WEINBERG: Okay. Any questions or
9 comments?

10 (None)

11 We'll call the question. Denise, would
12 you call the roll.

13 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Deputy
14 Mayor Sharkey.

15 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: Aye.

16 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Trustee
17 Monoson.

18 TRUSTEE MONOSON: Aye.

19 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Trustee
20 Pang.

21 TRUSTEE PANG: Aye.

22 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Trustee
23 Weston.

24 TRUSTEE WESTON: Aye.

1 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Mayor
2 Weinberg.

3 MAYOR WEINBERG: Aye.

4 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: There
5 are four votes in favor, zero votes opposed,
6 zero abstentions. The motion is adopted.

7 MAYOR WEINBERG: Denise, I think it's
8 five.

9 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Five.
10 Did I say four again? Five votes in favor,
11 zero votes opposed and zero abstentions. The
12 motion is adopted.

13 I'm sorry. I have four in my head.

14 TRUSTEE WESTON: Somebody just doesn't
15 count.

16 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: I have
17 eliminated one of you.

18 TRUSTEE WESTON: That's it.

19 MAYOR WEINBERG: All right.

20 * * * * *

21 MAYOR WEINBERG: We had a suggestion from
22 a Thomaston resident, and so I just wanted to
23 have a little board discussion of this.

24 Based upon landscapers using, in

1 particular, gas-powered blowers which we have
2 a prohibition against during this period of
3 time -- I believe the prohibition is from
4 what is it? May 1st to September 15th?

5 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: May 1st
6 to September 30th.

7 MAYOR WEINBERG: And out of all the
8 powered equipment, obviously the gas-powered
9 blowers certainly make the most noise. And
10 the landscapers typically operate on a
11 holiday. They're not prohibited from doing
12 so under the code.

13 So they typically do not operate on
14 Sundays for simple reasons that they rarely
15 operate 7 days a week, although an individual
16 resident can certainly take care of their own
17 landscaping on a Sunday. But the complaint
18 was the use of the gas-powered blowers and
19 operating on holidays, which maybe
20 landscapers continue to work on.

21 So one thought was either bar the --
22 either changing the Village Code to prohibit
23 landscapers from working on Sunday or a legal
24 holiday. Another possibility or both was

1 licensing of landscapers. And the idea
2 behind licensing, in order to work in the
3 village, it would require landscapers to
4 certify that they have the proper equipment
5 to actually operate in the village.

6 Specifically they have, again, battery
7 operated or electric blowers instead of gas
8 blowers in order to operate in -- within the
9 village. Some landscapers do utilize those
10 devices, and others do not. And the reality
11 is our inspectors, while they are there on a
12 staggered schedule, they aren't always
13 available when the landscaper is using a --
14 improper equipment.

15 So I just wanted to get some general
16 feedback to see if there was a consensus as
17 to whether we should do one or both measures,
18 or none of the above, or whether we should
19 consider one or both measures, or none of the
20 above.

21 I will open it up to comment from the
22 Board.

23 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: Question. Are we
24 talking about a license or a fee, or is it

1 interchangeably?

2 MAYOR WEINBERG: We're talking about a
3 license that you would be subject to a
4 violation. There would be a minor fee for
5 the license. It's not -- the purpose of this
6 is not merely for revenue as much as it is to
7 really make sure that if a landscaper is
8 operating, they're licensed by the Village
9 and they have the proper equipment.

10 Also arguably it makes -- it might make
11 it a little easier for our inspector to write
12 a ticket as to whether or not they have a
13 license as oppose to whether or not they're
14 using the appropriate equipment during the
15 appropriate periods of time.

16 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: I know from
17 experience my own landscaper complains about
18 if he had to use, say, an electric lawnmower
19 or electric blower it would be very expensive
20 for him to do so. And they're not as
21 efficient as the gas blower. It's obviously
22 a higher cost to run, own and operate.

23 So the question that I have in mind is if
24 we have a license with a license mandate that

1 they have electric powered equipment.

2 MAYOR WEINBERG: This is only to enforce
3 the laws as they're currently written. So
4 they wouldn't have to change all the
5 equipment. They would just have the electric
6 powered or battery-operated blower instead of
7 the gas blower.

8 TRUSTEE WESTON: Can I ask a question?
9 How pervasive are the complaints and how
10 pervasive are the violations? Are these
11 isolated complaints or is there an endemic
12 problem within the Village?

13 MAYOR WEINBERG: The complaints are a
14 particular resident. The problem does seem
15 to be endemic as the leading violation that
16 could be written. Despite violations being
17 written for gas-powered blowers, landscapers
18 are routinely ignoring that part of the law.
19 We did have a hearing -- oh, Denise, do you
20 remember, about a year ago on this?

21 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: About a
22 year ago.

23 TRUSTEE MONOSON: We had that very, very
24 well attended meeting.

1 MAYOR WEINBERG: It was very well
2 attended. And there were quite a number of
3 residents who truly wanted not only the
4 blower restriction to remain part of the
5 Village Code which we -- which it has and we
6 agreed, they wanted it enforced.

7 And -- so that's something that's always
8 in the back of my mind that unfortunately the
9 current situation before or after COVID is
10 that landscapers are routinely ignoring the
11 gas blower law or the law that prohibits gas
12 blowers for a particular part of the season.

13 TRUSTEE PANG: I think we've discussed
14 this before and we kind of agreed that an
15 electric blower and gas blower is probably
16 the same kind of noise except the gas makes
17 that much smell. In terms of noise there's
18 not much difference.

19 And I'm also concerned how to enforce
20 this rule. Do we have, you know, people, you
21 know, walking the village 7 days a week? On
22 one Sunday there is a landscaper start at
23 eight o'clock next to my house. I talked to
24 them and I told them they have to start at

1 10:00. But I am worried that no one will be
2 able to enforce that code.

3 MAYOR WEINBERG: Is there a continuing
4 problem? If it is would you please give
5 Benny a call?

6 TRUSTEE PANG: No. Just one time.

7 TRUSTEE WESTON: I mean, I'm not sure if
8 there is a major issue in terms of enforcing
9 a blower law or enforcing a regulation that
10 somebody is unlicensed. I mean the question
11 is if there's a widespread complaint. I
12 think it's more so a question of enforcement
13 and a question necessarily of licensing.

14 Whether somebody is going to be licensed,
15 I'm not sure it's going to change anything,
16 but are they going to get a ticket for being
17 unlicensed, or are they going to get a ticket
18 for violating the code? I'm not sure it's
19 going to add anything to the enforcement
20 powers.

21 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: Could the Village
22 mandate gasoline only or mandate only
23 electric? Do we have the authority to make
24 one or the other?

1 MAYOR WEINBERG: Well, we do, but -- and
2 again I'm not proposing that. I'm just
3 proposing utilizing licensing as just a tool
4 to try to get better compliance with the
5 blower -- with the current blower
6 restriction.

7 TRUSTEE MONOSON: Right. But more to
8 Burton's point, you can have the same people
9 can be violating it whether they're licensed
10 or unlicensed. So --

11 MAYOR WEINBERG: The only reason why I
12 think it's a valid -- I think it's a valid
13 comment. The only reason why it may help is
14 that if you're requiring them to actually
15 have the equipment -- the electric or
16 battery-operated equipment, if you've
17 required them to buy it and they have it --

18 TRUSTEE MONOSON: Yeah.

19 MAYOR WEINBERG: -- you would hope
20 they're more likely to actually use it as
21 oppose to just get it for you to show they're
22 in compliance and then go back to the gas
23 blower. I think in that way the licensing
24 restriction could help.

1 TRUSTEE MONOSON: Okay.

2 TRUSTEE WESTON: Could a license force
3 them to buy it? Perhaps they don't use
4 blowers. That's all.

5 TRUSTEE WESTON: I don't know if we're
6 the only village or if there are multiple
7 villages that requires electric blowers.

8 MAYOR WEINBERG: There are multiple
9 villages that require it. And there are
10 multiple villages that require licensing.
11 And those are certainly -- and Burton knows
12 those are excellent comments. And if there
13 is interest in doing this, licensing of
14 landscapers, it is -- we can follow up with
15 the Village Attorney and see how that can be
16 accomplished.

17 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: The reality is
18 that they do not use their blowers after
19 September 15th. So that when springtime
20 comes around, they have a mountain of leaves
21 to clear up and they charge their customers
22 three times what they would in a normal
23 month. So one way or the other the customer
24 is going to pay for it.

1 Personally I feel that if we're going to
2 have a license, then it should have some
3 teeth and it should be specific. Burton is
4 right. If we have a -- we issue a license
5 but it doesn't mean anything, what's the
6 point of having a license?

7 MAYOR WEINBERG: Okay. All right. Any
8 other comments?

9 (None.)

10 MAYOR WEINBERG: Let me continue the
11 discussion with the Village Attorney and
12 we'll see if it's -- I think the only --
13 again I -- Ben, I think you said this and
14 Joe, our inspectors are not working 7 days a
15 week 24 hours a day or -- not necessarily 24,
16 but obviously you would need them out there
17 literally 16 hours out of the day.

18 TRUSTEE MONOSON: And very early in the
19 morning.

20 MAYOR WEINBERG: And that's the only way
21 you're going to have the enforcement. And
22 that's not our situation.

23 So let's explore whether or not licensing
24 can be utilized with certain teeth to get

1 that -- that could add to the enforcement of
2 it, or if it's just a matter of once again
3 leaving it up to an inspector being there at
4 the appropriate time to witness the violation
5 and then issuing the summons.

6 Was there any -- what was the feeling of
7 the Board in terms of whether or not there
8 should be a prohibition of the landscaping
9 work on Sunday or on a holiday? Should we
10 leave the situation as is, or should there be
11 a restriction of the hours of operation?

12 TRUSTEE PANG: If the landscaper come to
13 work on Sundays, homeowners can tell a
14 landscaper to not do it. I don't know.
15 Should we apply the rules to all people?

16 MAYOR WEINBERG: Well, you don't --
17 construction by contractors under a permit is
18 not permitted on Sunday, but a homeowner can
19 do construction if they're doing their own
20 work. So there is a distinction between the
21 homeowner versus a contractor performing work
22 in the Village.

23 TRUSTEE PANG: Okay.

24 MAYOR WEINBERG: Any other comments?

1 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: Just an
2 observation. My guy, I've had him now for
3 nearly 35 years. He comes on Tuesdays. He
4 only comes on Tuesdays. So I'm curious as to
5 how many customers. If he has, say, 100
6 customers or 200 customers, for the amount of
7 time that he would show up on the weekends is
8 dramatically reduced.

9 So I don't know if we're chasing
10 windmills here. I would have no problem, at
11 least from my personal point of view, of
12 saying no landscaping on Sundays. That makes
13 a lot of sense. You need one day of rest.
14 Some peace and quiet.

15 MAYOR WEINBERG: All right. Thank you.

16 We'll table the discussion and continue
17 at another time after we get some additional
18 feedback from the Village Attorney.

19 * * * * *

20 MAYOR WEINBERG: All right. Next item on
21 the agenda is the Public Works Report.
22 Street sweeping did continue. There was
23 obviously lawn maintenance and maintenance of
24 the islands throughout the Village. We did

1 get some storms come through. We did get
2 some much needed rain, but clean up continues
3 from the storms.

4 The -- finally we were able to get the
5 concrete contractor out, pour the concrete to
6 finish the sidewalks at Lodge and Windsor and
7 Crescent and Windsor. The storm drains were
8 cleared. Planting. They actually
9 recommenced work on cracked sealing of the
10 roads.

11 And there was street light repairs.
12 There was an underground repair at Lincoln
13 and Crescent. Also a street light repair
14 consisted of the lamp and the photocell. And
15 there was some eight resident requests that
16 were addressed. And all of those items will
17 continue in the upcoming month. There may be
18 an addition to upcoming work which will
19 probably include removing a village tree at
20 235 Shore Road. That's it.

21 TRUSTEE WESTON: Quick question.

22 There was planting that was done today on
23 the island at the intersection of Grace and
24 Colonial just as you hit the bridge. Was

1 that done by us, or was that being done by
2 the railroad?

3 MAYOR WEINBERG: That was being done by
4 the Village.

5 TRUSTEE WESTON: By the Village. I
6 figured. I didn't think it was the railroad.
7 Very attractive. Mulched and planted. It
8 was very pretty.

9 MAYOR WEINBERG: Thank you. They try
10 hard.

11 * * * * *

12 MAYOR WEINBERG: In terms of any other
13 items of New Business?

14 Denise, were there any questions from any
15 callers?

16 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: I'll
17 just check the email in case any have come in
18 while we were here.

19 No. There were no questions or comments.
20 There is a couple of callers listening in
21 perhaps via the Zoom chat.

22 * * * * *

23 MAYOR WEINBERG: Okay. Would someone
24 like to read the -- be the movant for the

1 motion on the vouchers?

2 TRUSTEE MONOSON: I'll do it if you want.

3 Let me just see the bottom line here. Okay.

4 Denise, the one in our packet today is

5 the final number?

6 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Yes.

7 TRUSTEE MONOSON: Okay.

8 RESOLVED, that the vouchers -- sorry.

9 RESOLUTION 20-67 or 68? I guess it's 67.

10 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: 67,

11 because we didn't have a resolution for the

12 prior.

13 TRUSTEE MONOSON: RESOLVED, that the

14 vouchers, in the aggregate amount of

15 \$87,279.26 (as itemized on the Abstract of

16 Vouchers dated Monday, July 13, 2020), are

17 hereby approved for payment, all allocated to

18 the General Fund. A copy of the approved

19 voucher list is attached to these minutes.

20 MAYOR WEINBERG: Is there a second?

21 TRUSTEE WESTON: I'll second it.

22 MAYOR WEINBERG: Any questions or

23 comments?

24 (None.)

1 Call the question. Denise, please read
2 the roll.

3 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Deputy
4 Mayor Sharkey.

5 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: Aye.

6 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Trustee
7 Monoson.

8 TRUSTEE MONOSON: Aye.

9 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Trustee
10 Pang.

11 TRUSTEE PANG: Aye.

12 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Trustee
13 Weston.

14 TRUSTEE WESTON: Aye.

15 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: Mayor
16 Weinberg.

17 MAYOR WEINBERG: Aye.

18 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: There
19 are five votes in favor, zero votes opposed,
20 zero abstentions. The motion is adopted.

21 MAYOR WEINBERG: Thank you.

22 DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: I demand a
23 recount.

24 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR KNOWLAND: I got it

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right.

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MAYOR WEINBERG: Is there a motion to adjourn?

TRUSTEE WESTON: Sure. I will make a motion to adjourn.

DEPUTY MAYOR SHARKEY: I'll second.

MAYOR WEINBERG: Okay. All those -- Denise call the question. Denise, please call the roll.
